### February NRC Recap

The Natural Resources Commission (NRC) met today at the Michigan Library and Historical center.

Bear regulations were up for information for the NRC. <u>Wildlife Conservation Order #2 of 2025</u> proposes a number of changes to bear regulations.

For more information on the order check out MUCC's NRC Preview.

A number of regulatory issues considered by the department and the bear forum are also mentioned in the memo, with no amendment proposed.

Also, up for information was <u>Wildlife Conservation Order #1 of 2025</u> which allows for hunting to continue on the newly acquired Gete Mino Mshkiigan property, under state park land rules.

Both WCO amendments are eligible for action at the March meeting.

The director had four orders up for action. To learn more about these orders, read our <u>January NRC preview</u>.

There were two land transactions on the agenda, MUCC reviews all transactions exceeding 80 acres, which both orders do.

<u>Land Transaction Case #20240089</u> is a sale of 350 acres of surplus land in Crawford County for the Saab munitions plant.

<u>Land Transaction Case #20240082</u> is an 80 acre acquisition in Alpena County, the property will be managed as part of the Atlanta Forest Management Unit.

Before closing, Commissioner Walters requested an amendment to the Wildlife Conservation Order that would open up the year-round coyote hunting season. The amendment would be up for information at the March meeting, with a potential vote in April.

The next NRC meeting is on Thursday, March 13, in Grand Rapids.

# On the Ground: Wood Duck Boxes & More at Maple River State Game Area

On Saturday, February 15, 2025, 26 volunteers joined MUCC's On the Ground program in partnership with the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) for a wood duck nest box event at Maple River State Game Area in Gratiot County. This area located just north of Lansing consists of farm fields, woodlands, grasslands, and cattail marshes. It is a popular destination for hunters, trappers, birders, and wildlife viewers alike.

#### **Volunteers Maintain Nest Boxes & Remove Decking**

During this project, volunteers worked within three separate units of the state game area. Each group checked nest boxes and replaced old nesting material with fresh material as needed. Any use of the nest boxes by either wood ducks or other wildlife was also noted onto a data sheet. One group of volunteers also installed two brand new boxes in an area adjacent to several ponds. These new boxes will help increase nesting success even further for this incredible species. They will continue to be monitored by the DNR in addition to the existing boxes. Additionally, brush covering the entry of the boxes was cleared and used to create brush piles for small game habitat.

Another group of volunteers removed old decking from a cross-bridge located between two units. Removal was fairly easy given that the boards were old and rotting away, which made the project all the more important. The boards will be replaced with fresh wood later in the year, therefore improving hunter accessibility. In total, volunteers improved approximately 49 acres of wildlife habitat directly through this project.

#### Why Is It Important?

Maintaining nest boxes for wood ducks is important to ensure this species is around for many years to come. Wood ducks are beloved birds and very popular among waterfowl hunters and birders alike. Males have a green and iridescent head with a chestnut-colored chest and other striking markings, and females are a grayish brown with white teardrops around their eyes (Cornell University Lab of Ornithology). According to the Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR), wood ducks are second only to mallards in being the most common species harvested during waterfowl season in Michigan.

Wood ducks are cavity-nesting birds, meaning they build their nests inside sheltered areas like tree cavities. They typically nest in places where a branch has broken off and the wood has subsequently rotted, creating a hole inside of the tree (Cornell University Lab of Ornithology). When suitable nesting cavities become scarce, artificial nest boxes are a great alternative. According to the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, wood ducks were almost pushed to extinction along with other commonly hunted birds in the early 1900s due to overhunting and habitat loss. Regulations during this time were very minimal, which allowed hunters to harvest wood ducks faster than they could reproduce. Biologists began building and installing artificial nest boxes in the 1930s as a way to help boost populations. Additionally, regulations like the Migratory Bird Treaty Act were created to improve protections for migratory bird species including wood ducks. As a result, wood duck populations rebounded and as many as 3 million breeding pairs exist across North America today (U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service).

# A career as a Conservation Officer in Michigan

"If you're looking for a rewarding career where you can spend time outside and teaching others about the outdoors, don't miss this opportunity to be a part of a DNR conservation officer recruit school," said Chief Gary Hagler, DNR Law Enforcement Division. "Our recruits say the conservation officer academy is one of the biggest and best challenges of their lives, setting them up for success in a one-of-a-kind career they love."

#### Steps to apply

1. A physical fitness test and entry-level law enforcement exam are the first two steps toward submitting an application.

Sign up for a <u>physical fitness test offered</u> through the Michigan Commission on Law Enforcement Standards.

- 2. Complete the <u>National Testing Network entry-level law enforcement exam</u>. A passing test score is valid for one year. While the civil service exam is currently unavailable, applicants residing in Michigan who have successfully completed the civil service exam within the past five years can submit those exam results.
- 3. After receiving passing test results, candidates can submit their applications through the <u>State of Michigan job openings website</u>.

Candidates should be motivated self-starters with excellent communication skills who enjoy helping others learn about natural resources.

Applicants are not required to have a college education, background in law enforcement, or fish and game experience. All conservation officer recruits will receive comprehensive training during the academy, as well as being paired with veteran DNR conservation officers during their first assignments after graduation.





# What's Cooking Shepherd's Pie

While many enjoy corned beef and cabbage on St. Patrick's Day Shepherd's Pie offers a flavorful alternative with deep Irish roots

- 1 1/2 lbs russet potato's
- 2 tbsp. canola oil
- 1 cup chopped onion
- 2 carrots, peeled and finely diced
- 2 cloves garlic, minced
- 1-1/2 ground lamb
- 1-3/4 tsp kosher salt
- 3/4 tsp. freshly ground black pepper
- 2 tsp, tomato paste
- 1 cup chicken broth
- 2 teaspoons chopped fresh rosemary
- 1 tsp. chopped fresh thyme
- 1 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1/4 cup half & half. 1/4 cup unsalted butter
- 1 large egg yolk
- 1/2 cup corn kernels, fresh or frozen
- 1/2 cup peas, fresh or frozen

#### Method

- \*Preheat oven to 400 deg. F
- \*Boil diced potatoes in a saucepan until tender. 10-15 min.
- \*Saute onion and carrots in oil over medium –high heat for 3-4 min. then add garlic, meat, salt and pepper, cooking until browned.
- \*Stir in flour, then add, paste, broth Worcestershire sauce, rosemary, and thyme, Simmer until thickened 10-12 min.
- \* Warm half & half and butter in microwave. Mash drained potatoes, mix in warm liquid, salt and pepper, and egg yolk.
- \*Spread meat mixture in a 7x11 in. baking dish, top with peas and corn and mashed potatoes, sealing the edges.
- \*Bake on parchment lined pan for 25 min. until golden. Let rest 15 min. before serving.
