




OTG Volunteers Needed: Dam Improvement Project at the Blind Sucker Flooding

On **Saturday, September 14, 2024, from 10 AM to 2 PM**, Michigan United Conservation Clubs (MUCC) will be hosting a dam improvement project in partnership with the Michigan DNR at the Blind Sucker Flooding in Luce County. This area is home to many species of fish and wildlife and offers recreational opportunities such as hiking, camping, canoeing, kayaking, and swimming. All ages are welcome to attend, so bring a friend or two if you'd like! For more details and to register, click HERE.

About the Project

This project involves improving the dam directly and restoring wildlife habitat in areas surrounding the dam. Volunteers will first work to mitigate erosion at the dam by filling in areas with gravel. In addition, volunteers will plant native plants in the surrounding area and remove invasive species using hand-pulling methods. Volunteers will meet at the **Blind Sucker #1 State Forest Campground** (46.669284, -85.761805). Any necessary equipment will be provided including work gloves, buckets, shovels, and garbage bags. Closed-toed shoes, long pants, and a long-sleeved shirt are recommended. This event will take place rain or shine unless there is severe weather so please dress accordingly.

Why is it Important?

Although improving a dam may not seem like a typical habitat restoration project, it still provides benefits to local fish and wildlife populations. Too much erosion of a dam can cause dam failure, which leads to flooding and environmental damage. Mitigating erosion early by adding gravel or other structures to a dam can help offset these risks well into the future.

Restoring wildlife habitat in surrounding areas near the dam also provides benefits to fish and wildlife. By removing invasive plant species, native plants are better able to grow and reproduce. Replanting native plants also allows for them to become established in new areas. These habitat restoration efforts create new opportunities for fish and wildlife to have adequate food and cover sources.

August 2024 NRC Recap

The commission voted on modernizing the federal duck stamp at this month's Natural Resources Commission (NRC) meeting in Detroit.

There was only one vote for action, which passed unanimously.

Wildlife Conservation Order #7 of 2024 amends the wildlife conservation order (WCO) to match new federal rules for duck stamps. The new rules make the stamp valid from the date of purchase (after July 1, 2024) through June 30, 2025. The regulatory language matches new federal rules.

Up for information was <u>Wildlife Conservation Order #8 of 2024</u>, This order creates new guidelines for the Mentored Hunting Program that allows youth and adult individuals with cognitive or intellectual impairments, who cannot pass a hunters safety test, to hunt under the direct supervision of a mentor indefinitely.

This order comes on the heels of <u>Gov. Whitmer signing MUCC supported HB 5737 on July 24th</u>.

Also up for information were several fisheries orders.

<u>Fisheries Order 200.25 Trout and Salmon regulations.</u> This order clarifies a few boundaries, and amends steelhead size limits for a number of streams. This change is to make the steelhead regulations less complex but follow the spirit of the commissions 2023 change.

<u>Fisheries Order 210.25 Designated Trout Streams</u>. This order also clarifies boundaries and designates the Rio Grande Creek as a type 1 trout stream.

<u>Fisheries Order 224.25 Regulations on the Take of Reptiles and Amphibians</u>. Allows for the temporary relocation or removal of certain reptiles and amphibians on private property, moves three species from Group 1 to Group 2 (threatened and endangered), the order also removes blowguns as a legal method of take for reptiles and amphibians.

<u>Fisheries Order 254.24 Inland Lakes Trout and Salmon Regulations.</u> Removes Type C designation on Lime Lake (Leelanau), due to poor stocking success.

There are five land transactions up for action this month. MUCC only reviews land transactions exceeding 80 acres, of which there were two. Land Transaction Case #20220163 is a state purchase of 8,841 acres in the Pigeon River Country Forest Management Unit. Land Transaction Case #20220065 is a swap of mineral rights to consolidate state owned surface and mineral rights.

The next meeting is Thursday, September 12, at Lansing Community College West.

*Resolution C Submitted by: Patrick Hogan, Life Member Proposed: August 17, 2024 Policy Board Meeting Title: Support Conservation Over Preservation Whenever Possible

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED: MUCC recognizes conservation as the wise use of natural resources today, while ensuring the resource can be wisely used into the future, and, BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: MUCC recognizes preservation as seeking to prevent nature from use; and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: MUCC recognizes the importance of the human element within nature and everything that comes with it. MUCC will support Conservation over preservation whenever possible

*Resolution D Submitted by: Jonathan Durtka, Individual Member, Patrick Hogan, Life Member Proposed: August 17, 2024 Policy Board Meeting Title: Expand Underwater Spearfishing Opportunities

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: As long as it is supported by sound science provided by our MDNR fishery biologists that MUCC adopt the policy to create fair access to Michigan's aquatic resources and support the expansion of underwater spearfishing opportunities for game species to coincide with current species-specific regulations and include waters in the Great Lakes and Great Lakes connecting waters, as defined by Lake St. Clair, St. Clair River, St. Mary's River, Detroit River, and to exclude designated trout lakes, designated trout streams, and tribal treaty waters.

*Resolution E Submitted by: Zach Snyder, Individual Member Proposed: August 17, 2024 CPB Meeting Title: Bear tree stands at legal bait sites prior to Sept 1

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: MUCC work with the proper parties to give bear hunters the ability to place their tree stand on public land at actively tended legal bait sites, and ONLY at actively tended legal bait sites, beginning the day baiting becomes legal.



<u>Bucks of Michigan.</u> I think we were all surprised just how much history they have compiled on harvested game in Michigan they consist of; Bear, Deer Elk and Turkey.



Deer and Elk are divided into 2 categories; Typical and Non Typical categories and measured using he Boone & Crockett system which generally determines based on length and thickness. Therefore, in order for a deer of elk to be scored the skull plate needs to be preserved, and the rack has to dry for at least 60 days. Bears are measured based on their skull and also need to be dried for 60 days before being measured. Turkeys are scored based on length of the beard and the length of both spurs, and no drying period is required. Harvested turkeys are divided into Single Bearded and Multi-Beard categories. All entries are further broken down into separate weapon categories for Bow, Crossbow, Muzzleloader, Firearms and Handgun. For the annual competition, separate awards for Youth, Women and Seniors are also awarded. Wetland Wonders

The Michigan Department of Natural Resources (DNR) oversees a series of Managed Waterfowl Hunting Areas (MWHAs) throughout the state dedicated to providing residents with access to the best waterfowl hunting around.

These areas, nicknamed "Wetland Wonders", contain high-quality nesting and migration habitat for waterfowl and other wetland species.

The DNR manages these MWHAs using a 10-year strategic plan developed by a workgroup with the Wildlife Division.

This plan aims to address issues like declining hunter numbers and projected declines in budgets, while also defining priorities and providing management consistency between MWHAs.

The public funds these waterfowl areas through hunting licenses and area use fees.

Seven locations conduct daily drawings for free hunting zone permits throughout the open season. These locations are scattered throughout Michigan and include Fennville Farm Unit at Allegan SGA, Fish Point SWA, Harsens Island at St. Clair Flats SWA, and Point Mouillee SGA.

Fennville Farm Unit at Allegan State Game Area

The Fennville Farm Unit at Allegan State Game Area is a popular spot for Canada goose hunting. The unit itself is primarily field hunting but also contains shallow water wetlands that serve as roosting habitat. Other species found in this unit include upland sandpipers, golden eagles, white-tail deer, and turkeys. Besides hunting, birding and wildlife viewing are also popular activities at this site.

Fish Point State Wildlife Area

Fish Point State Wildlife Area sits on the Saginaw Bay of Lake Huron. This area contains 2,477 acres of marshy areas, flooded corn fields, and dry agriculture fields perfect for waterfowl. Nicknamed the "Chesapeake of the Midwest", Fish Point is home to a very high abundance of waterfowl like Canada geese and many species of ducks. Several snowy owls also take up residence here during the winter. Canoeing and kayaking, fishing, and birding are a few of the popular activities in this area.

Harsens Island at St. Clair Flats State Wildlife Area

Harsens Island is located on the shores of the St. Clair Flats, which is part of the largest freshwater delta in the United States. A car ferry ride is required to reach the 3,355 acres of strictly managed waterfowl habitat, which consists of marshy areas, open water, and flooded agriculture. Hunters most commonly harvest mallards on Harsens Island. Additionally, species harvested include black ducks, pintail, wood ducks, and Canada geese. Recreational activities like fishing, birding, and wildlife viewing are very popular in this area. **Continued on next pg.**

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Pointe Mouillee State Game Area

Pointe Mouillee State Game Area is one of the largest freshwater marsh restoration projects in the world. In addition to waterfowl hunting, its 4,040 acres of pristine habitat make it a very important birding site in the Midwest. Birders commonly find bald eagles, osprey, blackbellied plovers, and whimbrels in this area. Many people enjoy fishing, biking, and wildlife viewing at Pointe Mouillee. This state game area also hosts an annual waterfowl festival in September.

What's Cooking? Salmon En Crute' (4 Portions)

"Dixie Dave's" Recipe on Mike Avery Outdoor Show

Listen to Mike's show on Sunday's at 5am-8am on WBCK FM 95.3 Battle Creek

- 8- 10 boneless, skinless salmon fillets
- 2 Sheets of puff pastry, cut in half
- 2-3 Ounces of crab meat and /or de-vined shrimp

Dill Weed (optional) Splash of white wine, Splash of lemon juice

- 2 pats of butter, Dash of white pepper
- 1 Garlic Clove, diced fine.
- 1/2 Medium onion, sliced fine.
- 2 Eggs beaten well

Method:

Lay out one sheet of puff pastry, place fish with skinned side down on dough, arrange shredded crab/shrimp, dill, garlic, onion, pepper, butter, lemon juice, and white wine on top of salmon. With pastry brush, paint edges of dough with egg wash. Place second. Place second pastry sheet over top, gently press out air and seal edges so juice will not leak out. Carve to look like a fish or leave plain.

Brush top of pastry with egg wash. Bake at 350 deg. 30-45 min or until golden brown.
